Charges laid in abduction

Three Burlington residents who allegedly abducted a woman last year and held her against her will at two locations in the Milton area have been charged.

On December 21 at about 8:30 a.m., a 22-year-old woman was walking to work in Hamilton when she was surrounded by a group of males who forced her into a nearby van, which then sped off, Hamilton police said.

Det. David Brady of the Hamilton Police Service said she was transferred to another vehicle and taken to a "Milton-area location" where she was held. He wouldn't specify the exact location.

The woman was held there until December 30, and was then taken to another spot in or near Milton, a residence.

Later that day, she managed to escape from the home and went to a neighbouring house where Halton police were called. They began an investigation, which was then taken over by Hamilton Police Service.

Family members of the victim were arrested Sunday.

"It's an ongoing investigation, and we expect further arrests will be made," Det. Brady said.

The victim's father and brother, Burlington residents aged 53 and 25 respectively, have been charged with abduction and forcible confinement. Her 54-year-old mother, also from Burlington, has been charged with forcible confinement.

The accused parties will appear in court August 28.
