Field-building coach beloved by players

Te didn't hear any voices whispering from his corn I field, but Dave Saliba built it anyway.

Like Ray Kinsella, who built a baseball field in his Iowa corn field in the movie Field of Dreams, Saliba gets a few odd looks when he schedules exhibition games or soccer practices at his rural Milton farm.

"It's not easy to get fields to practice on. Everyone says, You can teach them to play soccer in an open field, but how

do you teach someone to score without a net?" he explained. "So I thought, 'I'll put a field here.' It's lined, marked, the whole works."

Saliba's team has been using the field to squeeze in extra practices for two years. But building a regulationsize pitch to help his team to

practice on isn't even near the top of the list when it comes to why his players like playing for Saliba.

" He always tells us when we do a good job and he's the best coach I have ever had," said Becca Hinton, who plays on Saliba's Milton girls Under-12 select soccer team.

It's Saliba's dedication to not only helping his players improve but to make sure they have fun doing it that's earned him July's Champion Coach of the Month honour.

It's hard to argue with Saliba's success. Since assembling a select team from house league players, the squad has entered five tournaments, winning three and reaching the final in the other two. One of those victories cost Saliba his hair after he promised to let the team shave his head if they won the tournament.

But victories are only part of the equation.

"Some people can get too serious when they're trying to build a competitive team," Saliba said. "You can't lose sight of what it's all about. They have to have fun or they'll leave."

And the players are having fun. Often after practice, the team stays for pool parties or barbecues.


Saliba says he couldn't do it alone. His wife Debbie, who manages the team, and assistant coach Todd Carey are equally important.

"My wife does all the bookings. I can't even work a computer," he admitted. "Todd runs all the drills. I look after the technical aspect of the game and then Todd comes up with these wild drills to help them practice."

The end result is that the players have improved their skills.

"They've all improved. It's not like two or three have become superstars to make the team better. There used to be a lot of chasing the ball around. Now they're more of a complete team, with more passing. When they're doing that they can compete against anyone."

And in the eyes of his players, they have an edge on the competition — their coach.
