Making a splash in a unique twist on hockey

Couple set to compete at world underwater hockey championships

When John Harland first told his wife about the sport he had recently rediscovered, it wasn't an overwhelming response.

"I thought it was ridiculous," said Bonny Chan. "I couldn't believe something like this existed."

Five years later, Chan has warmed up to the game of underwater hockey - so much so that she will join Harland at the world championships next week in Sheffield, England.

"It took a long time to grow on me," said Chan. "I had tried snorkeling before but I had glasses so I couldn't get the mask to fit properly and I couldn't see much."

Underwater hockey is played in a pool with six players per side, wearing snorkel masks and fins. Players use short sticks to move a weighted puck along the bottom of the pool, and like hockey, try to score by shooting it into the opposition's net. Unlike hockey, you have to do it while holding your breath.

Harland said although some people can hold their breath for up to six minutes under water, players typically spend eight to 10 seconds under the water before coming up for air but may stay down as long as 25 seconds if they are involved in the play.

"It's a balance, holding your breath and

playing aggressively but conserving air. You learn when to relax on the bottom."

The turning point for Chan came when she got her own, properly-fitted equipment and contact lenses.

"Once you can see and breathe you can start focusing on the subtleties of the game instead of the fear of drowning."

Harland initially played underwater hockey as a teenager when he was growing up in Kenora. Now 30, he was reintroduced to the game six years ago while living in Seattle.

"I had been a competitive swimmer and I wanted to get back into the pool, but just something recreational," he said. "Then it turned into a competitive thing."

Harland says when he travels for work, he can always find a game with a local group no matter what city he's in.

Harland is the only player from Ontario on the 12-member men's national team. Over the past two years, team members have met to play, often just splitting into two groups and playing against one another. However, they recently had a chance to play the U.S. and the U.S. masters' team in San Jose and won the tournament.

Harland said Australia and the defending champion New Zealand will provide the stiffest competition while France and England will also be contenders in the 16team tournament.

This will mark Harland's second trip to the worlds but his first for Canada. He played for the U.S. at the 2004 worlds in New Zealand, shortly before moving to Milton.

The Milton Community Fund is providing funding for the couple to help them make the trip to England to represent Canada.

Chan, 33, will play for the Canadian women's masters (32-and-over) team. Though she said she wasn't very athletic when she started playing underwater hockey, Chan has since competed in a triathlon.

And she also enjoys the social aspect of the game.

"It's such a small community in North America. You get to know all the players," she said. "You show up for a practice in a new town and they're thrilled to have someone new there."
