## Durante tumbles way to international gold

Tops at Indo-Pacific championships

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eja Durante's first full season of power tumbling can be summed up in just one word — golden.

Building on the momentum of a triumphant national debut this spring at Quebec's Laval University, the 16-year-old Miltonian recently took top honours for Canada at the Indo-Pacific trampoline and tumbling championships in Pretoria, South Africa.

Overcoming a preliminary round spill that had her ranked third heading into the 15 and 16-year-old women's tumbling finals, Durante delivered two sensational performances when it mattered most to slingshot by a couple of host competitors and prevail in her first international meet.

She finished a razor-thin one-tenth of a point ahead of Malinda Carlini of Windsor in the seven-competitor class, thanks to a 29.9 second round

that eked her past the fellow Ontarian.

"I just ran the eight skills well and really stuck the landings," recalled the up-and-coming tumbler, whose gymnastics event can best be described as a floor routine without the dance element.

Part of a national-level training camp last weekend in Calgary, Durante now has her sights set on the 2007 World Tumbling Championships in Quebec City.

That's a pretty lofty goal for someone who's been competing in the sport less than a year. Then again, perhaps it's not — given her ever-growing goldmedal haul and a skill level that continues to climb.

"A few months ago I probably wouldn't have given the worlds serious consideration," said Durante who trains up to 30 hours a week.

"But the Indo-Pacific championships really opened my eyes as to what's possible. If I keep training hard and have the desire, I'd say my chances (of making the Canadian youth team) are as good as anybody's."

## NFC title game time changed
