
Krantz said he's "thrilled" to be appointed to the position in a campaign that will benefit local residents.

"He has provided excellent leadership to our municipality over the years and we are confident that his leadership as honorary chair will inspire others to become involved with this cam-


Every year more than 2,900 Milton residents require a CT scan.



Environment Canada is requesting feedback from the public on or before September 25, 2006, regarding recovery strategies for one endangered species in your area:

Henslow's Sparrow

The Species at Risk Act (SARA), proclaimed in 2003 for the protection of wildlife species at risk in Canada, requires that a recovery strategy be prepared for extirpated, endangered and threatened species. A recovery strategy identifies conservation goals and objectives for the species, including habitat needs, and is the first step toward development of future conservation actions, stewardship and protection.

Proposed recovery strategies are posted on the SARA Public Registry Web site (www.sararegistry.gc.ca) for a 60-day comment period. You are encouraged to check the Registry for a complete version of the recovery strategy and to learn more about species at risk.
