Proposed hydro plant doesn't belong on edge of urban Milton

DEAR EDITOR:

Pristine Power has applied to the Ontario Power Authority for permission to build a very large gas-fired hydro plant in Milton. A decision will be made on November 15. The plant is designed to produce hydro for about two million people. Only about three per cent of the hydro will be used in Milton.

The plant is on the edge of urban Milton, on Main Street (at Fifth Line), about two-and-ahalf kilometres east of the Milton Leisure Centre and Reding Secondary School. At the open house for the project, the environmental consultant advised:

 The plant will operate every day.

 Each day, it will use about 90 million cubic feet of natural gas (about the amount needed to heat 2,200 homes for one year).

Exhaust from the plant will

be released by two smoke stacks. Each stack will be 45 meters high and have a diameter of 6 meters. There will be 10 other stacks releasing water vapor, which may contribute to

very large. Each day, the plant and wildlife? What will happen will release about 86,000 tons of if there is a natural disaster, such exhaust. Each day, the volume as a hurricane, cyclone or exploof the exhaust will be about 83 million cubic meters.

 The exhaust will contain chemicals. Three of the chemicals contribute to smog. Smog contributes to asthma and lung disease.

 Two of the chemicals contribute to cancer. He advises that the percentage of these chemicals is minuscule.

 When the wind blows from the east, the exhaust will blow towards urban Milton and the Escarpment.

 There will be noise. Willis Family Fruit Farm has

September 1908

A somewhat successful flight was made by an aeroplane near Oakville on Monday. Carrying fifty pounds of sand, the air ship travelled for about fifty yards at a distance of about forty feet from the ground. The originator of this aeroplane is said to be an electrical engineer residing in Toronto, and a friend of Count Zeppelin, the famous German aeronaut. The trial apparently was perfectly satisfactory and now a larger machine will be constructed on the same lines, so that a man instead of sand may be carried. It is made of silk and bamboo and is operated by storage batteries.



The company is authorized to acquire and own lease, and work mines and mineral lands and deposits, to mine and test ores, metals and minerals and to carry on a general mining business. The share capital is \$40,000, divided into 4,000 shares of \$10 each and the head office is to be located in Milton.

Milton like other parts of Ontario has been shrouded in smoke for about a week, owing to large bush fires, not in this neighbourhood, but in the Lake Superior country, the counties of Renfrew Peterborough and elsewhere.
