

Police looking for home intruder

A Childs Drive woman got quite the shock early Wednesday morning when she discovered a man standing in her living room.

Police said the incident happened at about 1 a.m. The woman was in her basement when her dog began barking. When she went upstairs to see what was going on, she saw the man trying to unhook a DVD player.

He fled through the back sliding doors — through which he had entered — carrying a knapsack, cigarettes and loose change. Police said he rode away on a bicycle, judging from bike tracks.

The woman's husband was upstairs sleeping at the time.

Police responded, and a canine track

was unsuccessfully conducted along Childs Drive and Ontario Street, ending near E.C. Drury High School.

The suspect is described as white, about 25 with a slim build. He was wearing blue jeans, a jean jacket and a black hooded sweatshirt.

Electronics stolen

A large quantity of electronics was stolen from a Zimmerman Crescent home during a break-in last week.

Police said the break-and-enter took place October 23 during the day.

Stolen by unknown suspects was \$3,000 worth of property including a digital camera, CD player, MP3 player, PlayStation with games, portable CD player, gold bracelet, cell phone, man's ring, walkie talkie and case of beer.

Scale stolen

An industrial scale was stolen from a Steeles Avenue company overnight Monday. Police said the scale was worth \$1,000.

Car broken into

A car parked on Gowlands Crescent was broken into overnight October 26. Police said unknown suspects entered the unlocked vehicle and took a Nikon digital camera valued at \$550.

Equipment damaged

Construction equipment at Reid Sideroad and Guelph Line was damaged recently. Police said unknown suspects stole the batteries of two bulldozers and also removed 300 litres of diesel fuel from them.

Police are looking for the owner of a set of medals that was turned in to police Sunday. The medals, from the Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled, were found in a parkette near Lorne Scots Drive and Nelson Court.

Halton Regional Police are investigating a suspicious fire outside an apartment building.

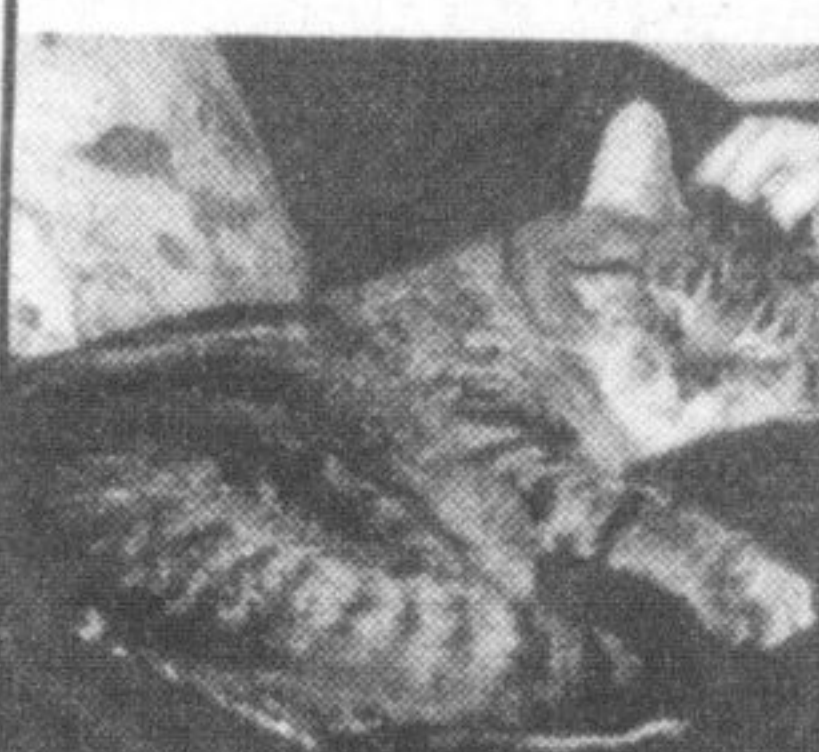
Shortly before 5 a.m. last Friday, three recycling bins at the rear of 211 Ontario St. were set ablaze causing \$5,000 worth of damage.

The bins were destroyed and the

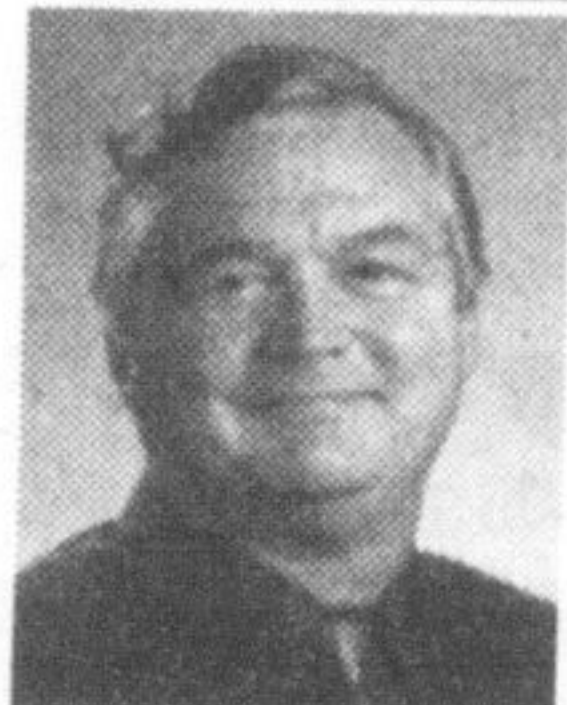
building's exterior metal façade received extensive radiant heat damage.

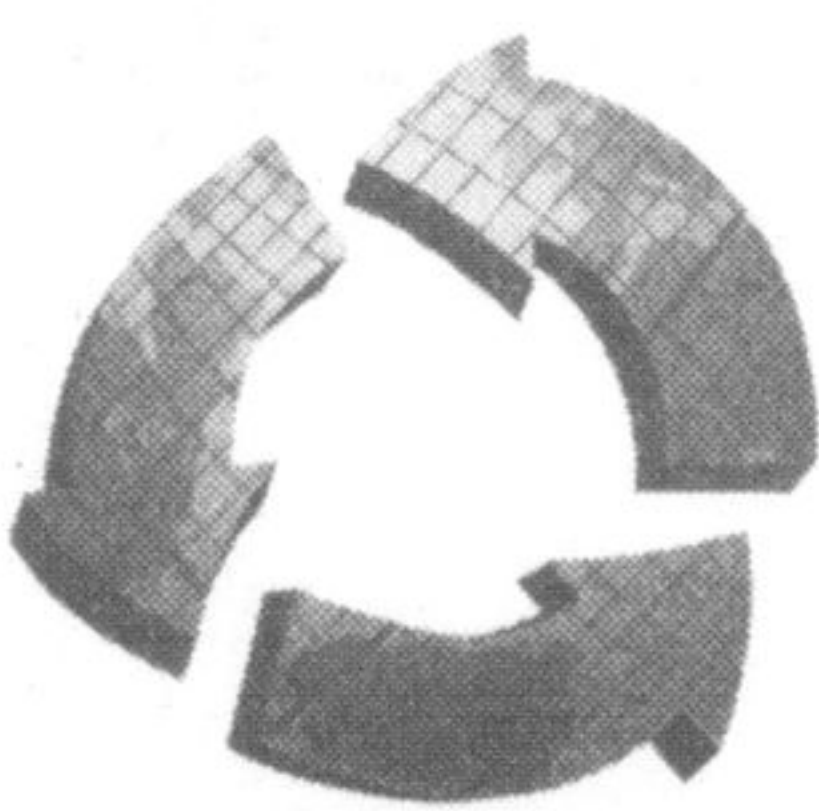
