

# Rare car worth \$200G stolen from Blue Line

Police are investigating the theft of a \$200,000 Aston Martin car.

The luxury vehicle — a company car — was parked at Blue Line Distribution on Lawson Road and stolen sometime between 7:30 a.m. Monday and 7 a.m. Tuesday.

The car is a black, two door, 2003 V12 Vanquish bearing a personalized licence plate, 'BLUELINE'.

"It didn't have all the souped up (elements) James Bond had on his," said Det. Sgt. Peter Hodgson, chuckling.

When it was purchased in 2003, it was the only model of that year in Canada.

Hodgson said when luxury cars are swiped, they often find their way overseas; they'd attract too much attention if they were driven in Canada.

"It was probably targeted for the overseas market," Hodgson said.

## Man faces drug charges

A Milton man was arrested last Friday and charged with trafficking drugs.

The arrest took place at about 5 p.m. by drug unit officers a short distance from the man's house, police said.

Later that night, at 10 p.m., police searched a home for drugs and seized five grams of crack cocaine.

Police began investigating a man in October who was suspected of traffick-

ing crack cocaine from his residence.

A 32-year-old Main Street West resident has been charged with breach of an undertaking, trafficking of a controlled substance and two counts of possession of a controlled substance for the purpose of trafficking.
