

Peewees on HNIC tomorrow

It'll be an especially memorable Remembrance Day for a group of local rep players — who'll no doubt be tuned into Hockey Night in Canada tomorrow evening.

The second Milton club this year to be part of Hockey Night in Canada's Hometown Hockey feature, the peewee AA Winterhawks will be seen on CBC at about 6:30 p.m. — at the top of the half-hour of pre-coverage for the Maple Leafs' home-ice tilt with the Montreal Canadiens.

The team was selected because it's sponsored by the Royal Canadian Legion's Milton branch, fitting in with the evening's Remembrance Day theme.

A CBC film crew taped the brief segment at

Memorial Arena Wednesday night, just after the Winterhawks' 4-4 comeback tie against the Brampton Battalion.

"They don't know about it yet. When they realize they're going to be on Hockey Night in Canada there's going to be a lot of excitement in that dressing room," said AA peewees head coach Mike Zuccato Wednesday morning.

Meanwhile, two other local hockey teams enjoyed a brush with notoriety this past week.
