Ellis and Brassard two of only four firefighters to be awarded the medal this year, and are the first Milton firefighters ever to receive the award

Two Milton firefighters who selflessly rushed into a burning building to rescue a young man were recognized Thursday with Ontario's most prestigious award for valour.

Steve Ellis and Andrew Brassard of the Milton Fire Department were presented the Ontario Medal for Firefighter Bravery by Lieutenant Governor of Ontario James Bartleman and Minister of Community Safety and Correctional Facilities Monte Kwinter during a ceremony at the Ontario Legislature.

Ellis and Brassard were two of only four firefighters to be awarded the medal this year, and were the first Milton firefighters ever to be recognized in this manner. In Halton, only one other firefighter has ever received the medal.

The two firefighters willingly risked their lives in a White Drive house fire in July, when they rescued an unconscious 21-year-old Matthew Grant from certain death.

Brassard said he's proud of the

award, but doesn't view himself as a

"It's what we're paid to do. There are tens of thousands of firefighters across Ontario who'd do the same thing in that situation," he said.

Steve Ellis said he'll wear the medal on behalf of everyone at Milton Fire Department.

"It takes a lot of teamwork and coordination to make something like this happen and to turn out the way it did," he said.

Milton Mayor Gord Krantz said he spoke on behalf of the entire town: "We in Milton are very proud to call them our own."

Fire Chief Larry Brassard said the whole fire department should be proud of the award.

"Everything we do in the fire service is done as a team, and so while it's very fitting that we recognize the heroic acts of Matt's rescue by Steve and Andrew, in a very real way, everyone who wears the uniform of the Milton Fire Department can be proud of this recognition."
