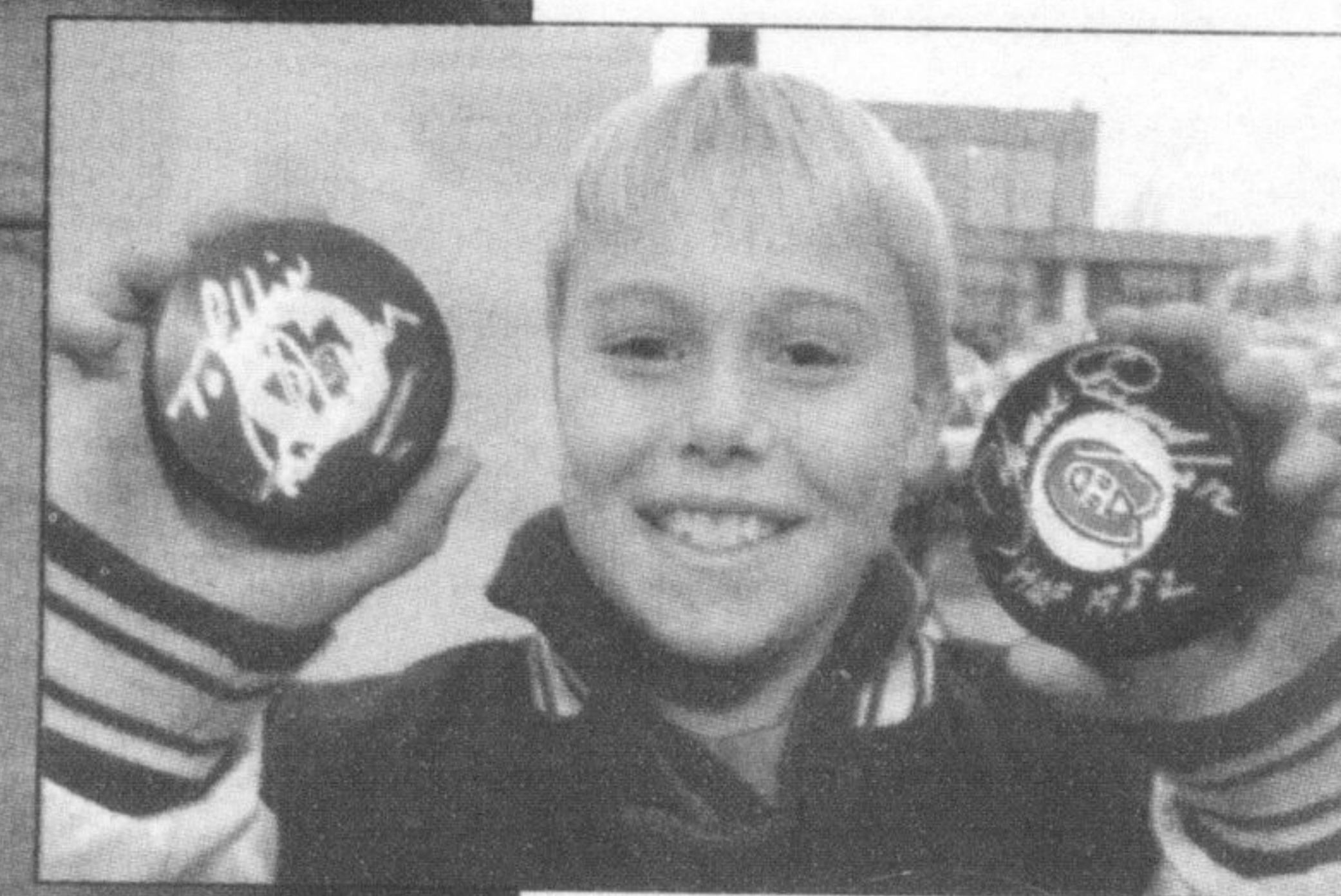

## Haydar continues to rack up the points

### Veteran winger sits 2nd in AHL scoring

Darren Haydar's early-season tear continues.

Recording his fourth consecutive multi-point game Tuesday night, the AHL veteran winger collected three assists in his Chicago Wolves' 8-2 rout of Iowa — which lifted them into a first-place tie in the West Division at 10-4-1.

Having found his way onto the score-sheet at least once in all 15 games so far, the five-foot-nine-inch, 170-pound assistant

captain sits second in overall league scoring with 11 goals and 18 assists. He's sandwiched between teammates Jason Krog and Brett Sterling, with the trio fueling a Wolves team that offensively is head and shoulders above the rest of the AHL with a whopping 70 goals so far.

Should Haydar be able to maintain his current pace — or anything close to it — he'll have no problem surpassing the 92-point campaign he delivered with the Milwaukee Admirals last season. That placed him fifth among AHL scorers.

Despite his consistency and near two-

points-a-night rate, hopes for a call up to the Thrashers don't look too promising right now for the diminutive winger. Having no trouble finding the back of the net these days, Atlanta is enjoying one of its best starts in franchise history and as of last night sat third overall in the NHL at 12-5-1-2.

Haydar is once again Milton's lone AHLer, as the Hamilton Bulldogs reassigned defenceman Jon Gleed to the East Coast Hockey League's Cincinnati Cyclones Monday.

A former standout with the Cornell Big Red, the six-foot-two-inch, 212-pound blue-

liner played three games with Hamilton this season and registered an assist in his pro debut against the Toronto Marlies October 25.

Should Gleed stick with the Cyclones, he'll get awfully familiar with fellow Miltonian Scott Bertoli, whose Trenton Titans face Cincinnati nine more times this season, with the next meeting set for January 10.

Captaining Trenton this season, 29-year-old Bertoli — the club's all-around sparkplug — remains on the disabled list after receiving 34 stitches from a nasty elbow to the head from Johnstown Chiefs' forward Adam Henrich November 3.
