 from TRAPPED on page A1 collar and began to pull him through the window.

Yelling for help, Coogan was assisted by another motorist, Steve Hudson, from the Orillia area. They managed to get Bajwa out of harm's way.

Within seconds, the entire van was ablaze.

"If I had literally been another 30 seconds to a minute later, he'd be dead," Coogan said.

The two men were taken to hospital - Coogan for cuts and bruises to his arm, Bajwa for a fractured pelvis.

Thanks to Coogan, Bajwa's now recuperating at home.

"If it wasn't for Darren Coogan, they wouldn't have even found bones on me," said the 12-year Milton resident, explaining it would have been too late by the time rescue crews arrived about 20 minutes after the crash.

Looking back, both Bajwa and Coogan said they're surprised more people didn't stop to help once the flames broke out. There was at least one tow truck driver nearby who stayed in his truck and didn't offer assistance, they said.

"People slowed down, rubbernecked, and drove on," Coogan said with disgust. "People have no compassion whatsoever."

Personnel from the Vaughan Fire and Rescue Service, who responded to the scene, want to make sure Coogan's extraordinary actions don't go unrecognized.

Deputy Fire Chief Larry Bentley said the fire department is preparing to give him a civil citation and is looking into federal and provincial recognition.

He agreed that Bajwa likely would've died without Coogan.

"It was truly an act of heroism as far as we're concerned," he told The Champion.

As for the deer that started it all, it was likely looking for a mate, said John Almond, area supervisor for the Aurora district of the Ministry of Natural Resources, since it's deer breeding season.

There's a heightened danger of deer wandering onto roads at this time of year, he said.

When the newfound friends met again in the hospital days after the incident, what struck Coogan most was Bajwa's young wife who "just sobbed", he said.

With his young family, newborn baby and a new house, "That poor bugger had a lot to live for," Coogan said without mincing words.

He added that since Bajwa's a diesel mechanic and his Jetta TDI runs on diesel, he's expecting an oil change or two - plus maybe a quesadilla from Montana's. And, come to think of it, that was his favourite work shirt that was ruined in action, he said, laughing.

Bajwa has no problem with any of Coogan's good-natured, half-joking requests.


