### Worried agencies turn to Region for help

Homeless programs may close if funding doesn't come through

Local programs for the homeless may be forced to close down next year if federal funding doesn't keep flowing, potentially leaving more than 500 vulnerable Halton residents without the support services they need.

That's what the Region's health and social services committee heard Tuesday from a group of local agencies seeking Halton's help in securing future funding allocations from Parliament Hill.

Transitions for Youth Executive Director Ellis Katsof, who represented the agencies that provide programs for homeless and at-risk individuals, told regional councillors about deficits the organizations will experience because of delays in funding announcements from the federal Supporting Communities Partnership Initiative (SCPI) this year.

He also said these agencies must hear by February 1 at the latest if funding will be continued next year.

"Otherwise, they will need to close down the programs and lay off staff by March 31 so they do not encounter additional deficits," he

"As of April 1, if these programs close, over 500 vulnerable Halton residents a year who suddenly find themselves homeless or at risk of homelessness will have no support services to help them deal with the challenges they are
