Fletcher named Halton police's new deputy chief of operations


Halton Regional Police will citizens of soon fill its vacancy for deputy chief.



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Watch out for Internet fraud: police

Residents selling items on the Internet are being urged to be cautious after a Milton resident was targeted by fraudsters.

Det. Rob Lloyd of Halton Regional Police said a local woman was selling her car on a Web site for \$8,000 at the beginning of December.

A potential purchaser told her he was going to send her a cheque for \$14,000, and that she should cash the cheque right away and send the extra \$6,000 to a third party for shipping costs.

When the cheque came, the woman became suspicious and called police, Lloyd-said, and the 'transaction' was stopped. Unfortunately, the fraudster couldn't be traced.

There has been a rash of these incidents, Lloyd said. The seller cashes the cheque and wires the 'extra' money to a third party. Of course, the cheque doesn't clear, and the seller loses the 'extra' money. The third-party is no doubt connected to the original purchaser.



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
