## '07 will see more gridlock: Krantz

But mayor says east end should get some relief

Looking into his crystal ball, Mayor Gord Krantz says he sees gridlock continuing to tie up Milton's roads in 2007.

That was one of the predictions the head of council had when chatting with The Champion about what he sees happening around town in the coming 12 months.

He acknowledged the biggest challenge facing Milton right now when it comes to growth is the "perceived and real" gridlock it creates.


"The tremendous amount of (road) construction compounds it," he remarked, adding that with many other roads projects on the horizon, "it'll just move the gridlock around for probably the next five years."

Getting people out of their cars and onto buses is key to eliminating traffic congestion, Krantz said, pointing out that ridership numbers for Milton Transit are continuing to climb.

He also said there should soon be traffic relief in some areas of town. For example, he said construction on Derry Road should be finished by early next year and work on Thompson Road is expected to wrap up by the end of 2007 or in early 2008.

"That portion (the east side) of the community will be pretty much finished by the end of 2007," he noted. "Things should start to open up in that

With several large developments slated for the west end of Milton, Krantz said he thinks the area west of

Bronte Street will start to face the same growth-related issues and challenges the east end has dealt with.

And for anyone who thinks growth isn't going to continue to happen locally, Krantz said they're wrong.

He pointed to the

Province's Places to Grow plan, which designates the region as an area that will be heavily developed in the coming decades.

He said the fact the Ontario plan recently won an award from the American Planning Association "tells me what's being advocated for Milton


