Drury trio makes Team Ontario cut

Will be part of field hockey nationals

.C. Drury will be well represented in national field hockey competition this summer. Adding another chapter to the school program's ongoing success story, Spartans Shaelyn Johnston, Stephanie Takeuchi and Allison Wallis recently secured Team Ontario status and subsequent berths to the 2007 Canadian Outdoor Field Hockey Championships in Vancouver.

The trio represent a qualifying sweep for Drury — as the only three players to try out late last year at the University of Toronto. While not sure yet whether they'll be on first or second-entry teams for the nationals, Johnston and Takeuchi have earned themselves a spot among Under-16 provincial ranks and Wallis will compete with one of the two Ontario Under-19 squads.

"I'm so excited," said 15-year-old Johnston, who's played an all-purpose utility role with the Spartans and could see time both as a forward and midfielder with Team Ontario. "This is almost like a dream come true."

One of the youngest members of the Under-19 provincial lineup, 16-yearold Wallis was equally pleased to make the cut — especially since she follows in the footsteps of good friend Lisa Brown, the first Drury player to make Team Ontario last year.

"Lisa's always been a person to measure oneself against," remarked Wallis, whose strengths lie on the defensive side of things. "She had a lot to do with teaching me to play, spending hours with me outside of practice. It (making cut) feels great. This has been a goal of mine for a long time."
