
Atom selects' fortunes take major upswing in London

Having yet to taste victory in 14 games prior to their tournament appearance in London late last month, Milton's atom selects engineered four straight wins to claim championship honours at the eight-team showcase. Fueled by standout efforts from a number of players, the Winterhawks kicked off their tournament campaign in high gear — and never looked back.

"We got up 3-0 in the first four minutes or so of game one and that really lit a fire under the guys," recalled head coach Robert Atkinson. "To go from not winning any games to winning a championship was like ... wow."

Playing the role of set-up man to critical acclaim in the finals, Spencer Csajaghy amassed five assists to aid the hot hands of Daniel Gaetan and Justin Sandluck — who had three and two goals respectively.

Chipping in a single was Maddie Jolivet, who finished the tournament with a handful of tallies. She was one of half-adozen selects to average more than a point a game in London.

Csajaghy enjoyed the lion's share of the offensive pie with two goals and six assists, while William Hamilton was close

behind with three goals and four helpers.

Among the other notable producers were Gaeten (three goals, three assists), Sandluck (four goals) and Mitchell Imhoff (three goals, two assists).

Equally impressive in their own end, the Winterhawks surrendered just three goals at the tournament, with a 7-1 opening-round rout of a Barrie team and back-to-back shutouts of two London opponents — 6-0 and 3-0 — thrusting them into the championship.

Tandem partners Lucas Accettola and Stefano Pezzot each delivered one goose egg and combined for a goals-against average of 0.75. Their near-flawless cage work was amply complemented by topnotch defence, particularly from captain Jeremy Farquharson and Nathan Brady.

The atom selects will look to build on their recent success at the end of the month, when they close out their season at a tournament in St. Catharines.
