Gala evening honours town's best Champion

Elegance was the order of the day at the 2006 Community Awards Gala Saturday night, with guests dressed in their finest tuxes and evening gowns - and dining on top-notch food while hobnobbing with Milton's who's who.

The crowning moment was an almost instant standing ovation given to Lifetime Achievement Award recipients James and Barbara Snow, and the admiration expressed by Ontario Conservative leader John Tory.

"Jim Snow was a towering figure in the government of Ontario," Tory said, explaining as Minister of Transportation for 10 years, as well as an MPP, Snow wasn't afraid to make his views known. "He was just an outstanding minister."

As master of ceremonies, former Milton councillor and now justice of the peace Mark Curtis highlighted some of the Snows' achievements, including their recent donation of \$500,000 to Milton District Hospital's CT scanner campaign.

Barbara spoke for both of them, mentioning the many fond memories the couple has of contributing to their community.

"We're proud to call Milton our home," she said.

Citizen of Year Award presented

As previously announced, the award for Citizen of the Year went to Del and Rose Oxford, who are known for their involvement with events like the Milton Santa Claus Parade. They also helped to start the Milton Sea Cadets, and Del is chair of the Town's Community Services Advisory Committee.

Del said he and his wife enjoy donating their time, and that Milton has been a great place to raise a family.

"Before, if someone had mentioned the word Milton, I'd be like 'Where?' But we'vebeen here for 30 years now," he said, chuck-

There were two President's Awards handed out. The first went to Nanci Job and Tarah Cherwoniak, who were responsible for starting up Milton's Relay for Life, which raised about \$400,000 in the past two years.
