doubled in 2006, according to the Ontario Ministry of Finance.

The ministry's recently-released list of civil servant earnings shows that 12 members of Town staff are now in the '\$100K club', compared to six in 2005.

Mayor Gord Krantz told the Champion that annual raises and keeping up with the rate of inflation put more Town employees into the higher earnings bracket.

He also said he thinks public sector salaries should be benchmarked at a rate higher than \$100,000, noting that things have changed dramatically since the Province introduced the Public Sector Salary Disclosure Act more than a decade ago.

"Many people now make \$100,000, even driving a dump truck," he pointed

Regional Chairman Gary Carr said Halton is trying to pay quality employees what they're worth. He said that has enabled the Region to employ smart people who have done their best, with their training and skills set, to help keep taxes down.

There are contracts Halton has to adhere to, he noted.

"We believe we have an excellent pay structure that is fair to our employees and is also fair to our taxpayers that ultimately pay the bill."
