# Hey Milton, time to play name that street

See how easy that is? Everybody would automatically know where in town you live, just by the name of the street.

Another area could be named after food.

"Got an emergency in the food section."

"We're on it. Which sub-section?"

"It's in the pizza area. 35 Pepperoni Place, around the corner from Anchovy Avenue, and just before Double Cheese Drive."

There's no reason we can't also make a profit on this. In order to defray the cost of changing your license (even though I think it's free), people can rent out their street name, and make a few bucks in the process. You know, like they do for stadiums. The longer the street, the more you'd charge, but everybody on the street gets an equal share. Companies pay so much per year for a contracted amount of 10 years. At the end of the 10 years the street is put up for bids again and goes to the highest bidder. That way, people might actually be glad to change the name of their street.

For example, you're in the brand name section of town — Health Products. You live on Viagra Way and after 10 years along comes Preparation H who wants to pay more for the naming rights. You don't mind the inconvenience, and it's an incentive for people to keep their streets nice to enhance its value.
