## Man's body discovered in Campbellville quarry pond

## Cause of death yet to be determined

Police divers found a man's body in a pond at an old quarry in Campbellville Friday.

Details are scarce at this point and the victim's identity and cause of death aren't yet being released, said Det. Sgt. Murray Drinkwalter, but he did say the victim isn't a Milton resident.

Police were alerted Thursday to the possibility that a distraught man was missing in the area of a pond located at an old quarry — private property owned by a Toronto company — on Reid Sideroad, west of

Guelph Line, police said.

Officers attended the scene at about 1 p.m. and located a truck with a boat trailer. A check of the pond soon revealed a partially submerged boat. A thorough search of the area above the water was conducted, but no body was found.

Friday, detectives from the Milton Criminal Investigations Bureau, Halton Police Marine Unit and the Peel Regional Police Dive Team searched the pond—it had been too dark for divers to conduct a search the previous day, Drinkwalter

explained. Mid-morning, shortly after the search began, the dive team located a man's body.

The deceased was transported to Hamilton General Hospital for a post mortem examination, but at press time yesterday, details weren't being released. The investigation into the deceased's identity and the circumstances surrounding his death continue.

Foul play is not suspected.

## No injuries in garage gasoline fire

Two teens learned a valuable lesson — don't play with fire — after a garage went up in flames when they ignited some gasoline.

Training technician Barry Kory with the Milton Fire Department said two 18-year-old males were working on a motorcycle in a garage Saturday night in the area of Thompson and Derry roads.

Some gas spilled on the ground and, thinking they could burn it off, the teens ignited it. The blaze got out of hand, however, and they quickly called 911, Kory said.

Fortunately, the fire was contained to the garage and was quickly extinguished. Nobody was injured

Kory said that gasoline should never be ignited. In the event of a spill, an oil absorbent or kitty litter can be spread over the area to absorb the gasoline.
