

hile the Harrop Restaurant is now in new hands, both the old and new owners want faithful customers to rest assured that's the only major thing changing at the fine dining establishment.

Long-time owner Robert Goderre turned over the keys to brothers Luis and Oswaldo Andocilla earlier this month — a duo that's no stranger to the Harrop.

Both have experience working in the Steeles Avenue restaurant, with Luis on staff for almost two years and Oswaldo since last July.

They've been able to see first-hand the popularity of the menu items and say they're only planning to add some special features.

"We have a very good menu going on," noted Oswaldo.

That comes as welcome news to Goderre, who heard loud and clear from the Harrop's long-time customers that they're very happy with the food selection offered.

Luis — who previously opened a bar at Yonge Street and Steeles Avenue said it was always his dream to own a restaurant, noting there's something special about the Harrop.

"I've known for a while I'd like to move on," he said. "There are a couple projects in Trinidad I'm very interested in. I'd like to open a restaurant there someday."

He said he has great confidence in Luis and Oswaldo, noting he thinks their expertise is very complementary.

Goderre said that he'll greatly miss the Harrop and its customers, whom he thanked for their many years of patron-

"This is my third restaurant and by far my favourite," he said. "There's just something about Harrop's — when you walk in the door, you're home."

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
