



Unless one has been through something like this you can never truly understand the emotional roller coaster ride that follows. It's not something one gets through alone. I would like to take this opportunity to thank a few — okay hundreds — who have been there for myself and daughters these two weeks.

First, to Const. Doug Williamson, thanks for being there for a very scared 14-year-old girl. I can only imagine the fear my daughter was experiencing that day, and I am sure your presence helped to calm her. You were the first face I saw when I arrived, and I have seen nothing but a constant stream of kind faces since that moment.

To Fire Chief Larry Brassard, Barry Kory and all the men of the fire department who responded so quickly and managed to save the structure of my house, thank you, thank you, thank you. You put your lives on the line every day, going about your duties not ever getting to know the victims of fire.

To my family of friends on Roseheath Drive, Milton has grown, but my street still has that small-town feel. Your support for my daughter that day will never be forgotten, and although I'm not living

on Roseheath, your continued support is felt daily. I look forward to the day I can return.

To the staff and students of Milton District High School, your love and support for my daughters has not gone unnoticed and is greatly appreciated.

My co-workers and other members of Peel Regional Police have overwhelmed me with their generosity. Your financial support has allowed me to keep my head above water and to breathe. Thank you just does not seem to be enough.

Now, to my sister Laurie and friends — the 'wall' as we like to call it. A phone call was made and within minutes your strength was all around me. You have made the most difficult days of my life manageable. You have allowed me to cry and through the worst of it, we as a group have laughed. Most don't understand the uniqueness of our small group, but on that day it was seen by many.

To Jude, Sharon and Ty, thanks for opening your house to us. I know three more people and a dog can't be easy, but you have made us a part of your family and once again that generosity will never be forgotten.

To my daughters, Alex and Sami, I am so proud of the both of you and how you are managing through this little bump in the road. Just know we are a strong team and together we will get through this. Today is the first day of the rest of our lives.
