On April 5, just before Good Friday, I experienced some chest pain, so my faithful companion and I shot off to Milton District Hospital where within minutes I was bare to the waist on a stretcher, with my vital signs being monitored. From there started a journey through ICU, the Trillium Centre, back to a surgical ward in Milton and back again to the Trillium Centre.

In each area I spent several days, a total of 10 in all.

While I lay on the operating table watching the surgeon work, via a monitor over my head, it occurred to me that several years earlier no such technology existed and people in my position would have been relegated to very restrictive lifestyles gency, ICU, the surgical ward - if they survived at all.

The people in the Trillium Centre now do heart bypass procedures laparoscopically. It's a brave new world indeed. My procedure took place at noon April 13 and at 6:30 a.m. the next day my son picked me up at the Trillium and we went for breakfast.

## Three more families affected by local diphtheria outbreak

'Time Capsules' are gems of information extracted from past issues of the Champion and other publications in order to provide a window into Milton's past. Explanatory comment is sometimes provided to place the situation in context.

#### October 1909

Up to the latter part of last week it was hoped that the outbreak of diphtheria had spent itself but it has since broke out in three families. One of the cases, that of a son of James Morley, is very serious but the boy is somewhat better now and it is hoped that he will recover. Yesterday at noon the public schools were closed until further orders. The Board of Health will insist that quarantine regulations shall be obeyed. Yesterday Police Magistrate Dice fined the father of a diphtheria patient \$5, the minimum and costs for allowing the placard on his house to be torn down.


