Residents send their healthcare funding concerns via postcards

More than 1,400 residents from across the GTA — including Halton — have delivered their healthcare concerns to their MPPs as part of an ongoing campaign that's pushing the Province to improve timely access to local hospital care.

They sent postcards to MPPs asking them to secure adequate and ongoing provincial growth funding to hospitals in their high-growth regions of the province and allocate it on the basis of population needs.

The response came as part of the GTA/905 Healthcare Alliance's Help Our Hospitals campaign in which posters and postcards were displayed in doctors' offices, hospitals and other

locations across the regions.

"Because the provincial government does not allocate hospital funding based on population needs and there is inadequate growth funding to meet the needs of the rapidly increasing number of residents in our communities, our hospitals are being shortchanged by almost \$900 million compared to hospitals in other regions of Ontario," said Kirk Corkery, chair of the GTA/905 Healthcare Alliance. "People who live in these high-growth regions recognize the impact this is having on themselves and their fami-

A recent poll conducted by Léger Marketing and Redfern

Research revealed that less than one third of people living in the GTA believe their hospitals are treated fairly compared to other regions of the province.

An overwhelming majority strongly believe their community hospitals should receive a fair share of provincial funding and more than half believe the quality of hospital care in the GTA has declined because of underfunding.

"It is clear that people living in the GTA/905 understand that their hospitals are underfunded and that this is affecting their timely access to health care close to home," commented Corkery.
