Lands scholarship with D2 Falcons

7 ith her stock continuing to climb, perhaps it's only fitting that the next chapter in Ashley Rutz's field lacrosse career should come with a team that's also on the rise.

Given the circumstances, it's hard not to see her recent signing with Notre Dame College Falcons — who announced their acquisition last week — as anything but a marriage made in heaven.

After all, the Ohio-based Division 2 school is fresh of its best season since joining the women's lacrosse scene in 2005 - finishing with more than twice as many wins over the two previous years combined with a 12-4 record — and has every starter set to return.

At least one of them will more than likely have to take a step back now that Rutz is in the mix.

"We're so excited to have Ashley as part of our program,"

said head coach Candace Taglianetti. "We anticipate that she'll have no problem in her transition to collegiate lacrosse and we expect great things from

Landing a near full scholarship with Notre Dame, Rutz expressed plenty of enthusiasm herself about becoming a Falcon.

"I'm so excited to be going there, and look forward to making an impact with

Delivering a sensational springboard to the NCAA, Rutz played her way to all-star status in the Interscholastic Athletic Association with St. Timothy's School — located just outside Baltimore.

Shining at both ends of the field, she closed out the year with a total of 50 points — 32 goals and 18 assists — and

amassed a whopping 79 groundballs to make a significant dent in her opponents' offensive efforts.

"Defence has always been my strong suit and that's probably the role I'll play at Notre Dame, but I'm definitely more confident in my offensive play after this year," remarked the provincial team veteran.

A prosperous campaign at St. Timothy's, she noted, was due in no small part to improved conditioning - no real surprise, with training equipment and facilities far more accessible than they once were.

"It was so much easier this past year. Before I'd have to go to Mississauga to train."

While Rutz has hooked up with the Falcons, she recently parted ways with another team.

Her resignation from the Canadian 19-and-under women's squad — for reasons she's choosing not to divulge - means she won't be part of August's World Cup at Trent University in Peterborough.

"It just wasn't the team for me," noted a tight-lipped Rutz, who'd solidified her national team spot with an impressive showing in Australia back in early January. "They supported my decision and we left it on good terms."

Notre Dame College's newest recruit will instead spend the summer playing for the Burlington senior team in preparation for her induction to the NCAA.

"I'm just going to keep training hard and work toward my goal of becoming an All-American," she said.
