

Linda Howard's To Die For may just be the perfect beach book. A bubbly ex-cheerleader has a mysterious but deadly stalker and a hunky police detective ex-boyfriend who wants to erase that "ex". Blonde? Yes. Dumb? Not on your life. But she's not above using the whole dumb, blonde, cheerleader stereotype to her advantage. It's one of the

funniest romantic suspense novels you will ever read.

One last title that's highly recommended is Clair Huffaker's The Cowboy and the Cossack. Even if you don't like westerns, give this one a try. It's a beautiful coming-ofage story — told from the point of view of a young man seeing the world for the first time - with cowboys, Cossacks, floods, wolves, tigers, philosophy, politics, explosions and cows. 


