The proliferation of gun-Halton's largest neigbouring community.

While Toronto braces for what may be its bloodiest year on record for gun-related deaths, there are indicathat firearms are becoming the weapon of choice among more criminals in Halton.

In July alone, guns were used in a terrifying July 16 early-morning Oakville home invasion in which a sawed-off shotgun was brandished, a July 9 convenience store robbery in Georgetown that saw two clerks forced into a freezer at gunpoint, the July 22 armed robbery of an Oakville man making a night deposit, and three Burlington incidents within


48 hours last weekend (July related crime is no longer 20 to 22), including one the exclusive problem of where a male victim was pistol whipped.

> Is the apparent flood of gun crimes in recent weeks merely coincidence, or is Halton's growth and its proximity to Toronto, Hamilton and Peel making it a convenient alternative for criminals armed with guns?

Are the same factors that are pushing Toronto toward a record-high year of gunrelated fatalities influencing a flood of gun crimes in our region?

Halton police have yet to put forward a theory about this phenomenon.

We only hope that the recent incidents represent an aberration and not a sign of things to come.
















Planning of Milton's roadways has left awful lot to be desired

DEAR EDITOR:

I understand Halton Region recently received an award for planning. If that had anything to do with the population boom in Milton, I for one am curious what the award criteria was - possibly driver annoyance and frustration level?

It's a major challenge to get from southeast Milton to the Steeles Avenue and Martin Street area nowadays. In the morning, traffic is backed up past my house on Trudeau Drive south to get onto Derry, which is effectively two lanes due to perpetual construction.

Thompson Road is now one lane for many hours a day due to construction, Fourth Line was closed 28 months ago, James Snow Parkway is just a short cut for Hawthorne Village north and while so far unhampered, Fifth Line leads to a onelane construction area on

Steeles. The corner of Main and James Snow was also ripped up, but is now thankfully completed.

I couldn't help but notice upon leaving Milton to the south on Regional Road 25 that it jumps to four lanes at Dundas Street to the east. Entering Mississauga, the roads jump from two lanes to four, on Derry at the 407, and south on Trafalgar. wonder Mississauga Hazel Mayor McCallion keeps getting reelected — and Miltonians shop outside of Milton.

To compound the situation, we have a proliferation of misguided advanced left turn stoplights. Large groups of eastbound Steeles and Ontario Street drivers have to wait for one or two - or none - westbound cars turning south. Ditto at Steeles and Thompson, Steeles and Esquesing Line and

several other intersections.

But the biggest slap in the face is at Derry and Armstrong Boulevard. There's very light traffic so far on Armstrong, as only a few homes are occupied. The lights go red for Derry on a timer — why? — then 85 per cent of the time there's no vehicles turning onto Armstrong. Yet long lines of traffic — in two lanes, including trucks and transit buses — must endure an additional 15 seconds of left advance green.

Why not let the higher volume traffic go instantly, then if there's still vehicles waiting to make a left they will be detected by the road sensors. Give them a few seconds each of delayed green, to a maximum.
