
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



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
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






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Annual event calls for end to violence against women

The 17th edition of the annual Take Back the Night event in Oakville is being called 'Dare to Dream: Ending Violence Through the Arts'.

It'll take place Tuesday, Sept. 11 from 5 to 9 p.m. at T. A. Blakelock High School, 1160 Rebecca St., in Oakville.

Organizer of the event is the Sexual Assault and Violence Intervention Services of Halton (SAVIS) in partnership with the Halton District School Board, Halton Organization for Pride and Education (HOPE), Halton Regional Police Services, Halton Women's Place, Nina's Place and T. A. Blakelock High School.

This year's Take Back the Night event will encourage people to say no to violence against women.

The 17th annual Take Back the Night will include an anti-violence concert with:
