The Town of Milton announced Tuesday that the position has been filled, with Brian Ellsworth taking the top spot at the Milton Fire Department starting January 2.


Ellsworth, 42, said he's looking forward to starting this new chapter in his life, and is excited about working with what he said is a world-class fire service.

Contributions can be made at either place Monday to Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.






