Banning book big mistake

I have to take issue with the Halton Catholic District School Board's ban on the book 'The Golden Compass.'

While this decision was certainly within the trustee's purview as a democratically elected body, I feel the board has made a dramatic mistake in not allowing their students to be exposed to this novel.

Books such as The Golden Compass present "teachable moments" for students. The book provides readers with the opportunity to critically analyze what the author is saying about their faith.

To limit access to these types of books lessens the ability of students to develop the skills necessary to broaden

their understanding about what it means to be Catholic and explain those beliefs to others.

Good debaters always know the other point of view, so they can develop their own arguments. By instituting a ban, the board has shown that critical analysis isn't an important skill for their students to develop.

Moreover, the real absence of any opposition from the church hierarchy, other school boards and even the board's own book committee I think shows this decision was made in haste, and was likely politically motivated.

I would hope the board re-considers this ban as expeditiously as possible.
