Drury qualifies nine for OFSAA wrestling

Tie host Bishop Ryan for top spot at GHAC

E.C. Drury's powerhouse wrestling team delivered another golden performance at the Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference (GHAC) championships Thursday in Hamilton.

Only this time they had to share the glow of victory.

Finishing in a dead-heat with host Bishop Ryan atop the team standings with 121 points apiece — the Spartans won five titles and qualified nine for OFSAA next week in Caledonia.

That's just one less than last year, when they fell a measly one point shy of a championship repeat.

Leading the way with their third GHAC titles were Bobby Fillman and Kevin Iwasa-Madge.

Dominating the 51kg division, Fillman went 4-0 with two pins to reign supreme. He now has 15 medals this season, the third highest total in team history.

Iwasa-Madge's triumph gave him 13 67.5kg division. golds for the year and boosted his career win count to 257 — tying him just short of reaching OFSAA with a with Chris Price for the all-time Drury lead. He and co-captain Mac Fillman both in their final GHAC appearance cruised through to the 61kg finals, where Iwasa-Madge scored the decision over his longtime scrimmage partner.

The silver medal gives Fillman his fourth trip to OFSAA — with the toptwo finishers advancing — while Iwasa-Madge will be making his fifth straight trip to Ontario high school wrestling's innermost sanctum.

Three other Spartans captured their first-ever GHAC titles.

Among them was red-hot Jared Robb, who's struck gold at his last three meets — including the recent juvenile provincials. He gave a standout performance in the 77kg class, with two pins highlighting a 4-0 day.

Also coming into his own, Ranhir Hans went 4-0 as well to reach the top of the podium among 47.5kg grapplers, while 57.5kg competitor Duncan Moffat battled back from a first-round overtime loss for a narrow decision against host rival Fadis Georges in one of the meet's most anticipated finals.

Rounding out Drury's OFSAA qualifying contingent with silver-medal efforts were Blair Norland (84kg) and rookies Chris Varas-Hedman (95kg) and Jeff Sinclair, who went an out-The defending OFSAA champ, standing 3-1 in the always tough

Five-year veteran Nick Ronan fell third-place finish — dropping two close matches to Hamilton wrestlers while also claiming bronze was Michael McLellan.

Drury will now vye for its 11th straight OFSAA team medal.




