## Bail hearing today for man charged in child porn sweep

A local man charged in a province-wide child porn sweep is scheduled to appear in court today for a bail hearing.

Court resident Michael Edward Shipley, 32, has been charged with one count each of making available child pornography, possession of child pornography and accessing child pornography, and is to appear at Ontario Court of Justice in Milton this morning.

He was arrested February 11 after Halton Regional Police conducted a search warrant and seized a quantity of computer

equipment found to contain images of child pornography.

Last week, Shipley made court appearances Wednesday and Thursday, but both times the date was remanded, so he hasn't yet had a bail hearing.

It's not known if the hearing will happen today or if it will once again be put over.

Shipley was one of 22 people arrested across Ontario in what's being called the largest co-ordinated child pornography crackdown in the province's history.

A heavyset man, Shipley had a goatee and was wearing a black winter parka and baggy khaki pants at his appearance Wednesday.

He did nothing to draw attention to himself at the court appearances, where he stood handcuffed in the prisoner's box until he was led from the room by a police officer.

Shipley didn't have any friends or family members in courtroom for the Wednesday or Thursday appear-

Due to a publication ban, the Champion will be able to report on whether Shipley was released on bail and the conditions, but not on the reasons behind the decision.
