oo many poems languish in writers' notebooks or on the backs of napkins, never to be read and enjoyed by others.

And to Jenny Panda, that's a shame.

"If you have a poem and it's not shared, that's kind of sad," she said.

The fourth Friday of each month, from 7 to 9 p.m., the Express the Arts group meets at Martindale Gardens on Martin Street to give poets — serious and otherwise — a chance to share their musings.

The next meeting is next Friday.

Sometimes the format is an "open mic" night, while at other times the sound equipment is abandoned for a more intimate gathering around the table, said Panda, the group's organizer.

Some people read their own works, some recite poems by the masters, while others simply enjoy listening.

All artists welcome

But it's not just a poetry group.

More recently, Express the Arts has expanded to include the visual arts and music, Panda said.

Attendees who express themselves through paint, clay or another medium, are encouraged to bring a piece of art to share, while musicians are welcome to bring their instruments to the group.

"Whenever you express yourself, you build a certain energy," explained Panda. "There's an elated feeling."

Panda — who herself is an author, poet and artist — said the group is always full of surprises.

"We really never know what will happen until it happens," she said.

In the past, the group has included bagpipes, tai chi and Indian dancers.

Members of all ages are welcome. Panda remembers a little girl who once came to play her violin to an appreciative group. She later

The group was started in 2002 by longtime resident Elizabeth Kiddle.

In honour of National Poetry Month which just happens to be next month — Kiddle decided to hold an open mic night at the now-closed Espress Yourself Café.

The turnout was beyond what Kiddle had expected.

"Nobody was more surprised than I was," she said, adding, "When I saw the response and gauged the enthusiasm, I

thought, 'We should do this once a month."

When Espress Yourself closed, the group moved to Milton Café, which also shut its doors. Now the group is enjoying its new home at Martindale Gardens.

Somewhere along the group's journey, Kiddle — who actually had no serious interest in poetry when she held the first open mic night — made an important realization.

"I had never conceptualized the idea that was a poet," Kiddle said. "Through the poetry evening, I learned I am a poet of a certain kind."

And that's not uncommon, she said.

"There are lots of people who come and find out they're more of a poet than they

Group members don't critique, but simply encourage each other.

"Poetry is a matter of the heart and soul. It's not an intellectual pursuit," Kiddle said.
