

Hefty haul for thieves as garage targeted twice

Police said the theft took place at a Toyota dealership under construction on Steeles Avenue. The yellow Case 580 backhoe was stolen by unknown suspects.

Garage broken into twice

A home's garage was broken into twice over three days.

Police said unknown suspects forced their way into the Governor's Court garage April 31 and May 2.

In the first incident, a table saw, a white Iron Horse bicycle and a grey CCM bike were stolen.

In the second break-in, hand and air tools were taken.

The value of the stolen property is pegged at a total of about \$2,000.

Equipment stolen

Construction equipment to the tune of \$10,000 was stolen recently from a vehicle.

Police said a van was parked at a Brownridge Road driveway between May 2 and 4 when it was broken into by unknown suspects.

Power tools and custom glass-cutting tools were taken.

Motorist sought

Police are seeking the driver of a vehicle that struck a parked van in the Milton Mall parking lot last Friday.

The incident occurred between 9:15 and 10:15 a.m. Police said a white Ford van was hit on the passenger side, causing a large dent and scratches.

The damage was estimated at about \$1,800.

Hydrant hit; motorist sought

Police are looking for a motorist after a fire hydrant was wiped out.

Just before 11 p.m. May 8, a witness observed a beige GMC pick-up truck lose control and strike a hydrant in the parking lot of the plaza at Main Street and Thompson Road, police said.

The cost to replace the hydrant will be \$1,200.

The suspect's truck would likely have damage to its front and undercarriage.

Generator stolen


A generator was stolen from a construction site overnight Saturday.

GPS unit stolen
