Royals win one for fallen 'mates

Emotionally-charged quarterfinal victory clinched in shootout

It certainly wasn't advancement to the regional semifinals that brought Alessandro Famele to tears Wednesday afternoon.

Moments after turning back the visiting Nelson Lords' final striker to

shootout win, the Bishop Reding senior soccer goalie could barely get the words out when questioned about the obvious emotional

That was the overwhelming consensus following what was without a doubt the most meaningful victory in the school's 20-year history.

Added captain Dane DaSilva-Horvat, "This is our trophy win right here... the biggest game of our lives. We played like a family and stuck it out."

Fittingly enough, the Royals prevailed in the most dramatic fashion possible after the two sides managed one regulation goal apiece and were

unable to settle matters through overtime.

From there, Erick Olazabal, DaSilva-Horvat, Krzysztof Staskowiak and Eros Olazabal beat Lords' netminder Johnny Klynkramer with bottom-shelf deposits and Famele denied Nelson's first and finale shooters to take Halton's AAA quarterfinal clash.

In a celebration that's not likely to ever be duplicated, BR's keeper was mobbed by pretty much the entire senior class, who joined with players and coaches for a prayer at midfield where their departed teammates/friends' jersey numbers had been spray-painted

for the tribute game.

With a sizable fan base and immeasurable emotion fueling them, the Royals came out with a dominating


first-half effort and severely outchanced their guests overall — testing Klynkramer close to two dozen times, with a handful of key opportunities coming in the extra sessions.

Eros Olazabal was the lone marksman in regulation time — scoring about midway through the first — while he, twin brother Erick, Nikola Repar and Thomas Santibanez-Espinosa had at least two big scoring chances apiece.


Mark Andrade thwarted one of Nelson's few opportunities early on, while with the exception of a brief second-half lapse the Royals delivered its most spirited performance this spring.
