More children being helped by Big Brothers, Big Sisters

Just a couple hours a week can make huge difference: director

The number of local children being helped by Big Brothers Big Sisters of Halton (BBBSH) has almost doubled over the past year.

According to the agency, funding from the United Way of Milton and the Milton Community Fund has helped bring the number of children it helps with mentoring services up to 92.

The increase can also be attributed to the

new BBBSH office located on Bronte Street.

"Having an office location in Milton has resulted in the agency experiencing tremendous growth in requests for service from families in Milton," said Elaine Collins, BBBSH executive director. "The programs that are run in Milton are solely for children who are residents in Milton and utilize Milton volunteers."

Funding from both grants has allowed

placement of four staff providing the following mentoring programs: one-to-one mentoring, The Club after-school tutoring, Go Girls! and First Mentors.

Recently BBBSH launched a campaign to find 100 men this year to be matched with a boy aged five to 14 for as little as one hour a week.

In Milton, the agency has produced a poster with local businessman Mark Burger of Spokes 'n' Slopes who recently volunteered to be an in-school mentor to a boy

who needs a buddy.

"You don't have to change your life to change his' is the essence of our campaign," said Wendy Somerville, north Halton volunteer co-ordinator.

"We want to get across the message to men that being a Big Brother is really about just being a buddy to a boy."

The Halton Region Greenlands Securement Strategy (GSS) is a proposal outlining the Region's plan for protecting valuable greenspace in Halton. The GSS aims to help protect the Region's significant natural areas such as forests, streams and valleys now and for future generations through the long-term securement of ecologically significant land. Halton Region intends to reach this goal through partnerships with conservation groups working to protect land identified in the Regional Greenlands System.



How can I find out more about the GSS?



- Assist securement Partners through leveraged funding opportunities for land securement projects;
- Ensure resources are available to implement the strategy; and,
- Report annually on the successes of this Greenlands Securement Program.
