## Moffat pins down Cadet Pan-Am silver

Momentary heartbreak, overall satisfaction.

That pretty much encapsulates Duncan Moffat's recent trip to El Salvador, where he delivered Milton's best-ever finish as part of the national wrestling program.

In another building block performance, considered one of the finest of his career, the 16-year-old Miltonian placed second at the Cadet Pan-Am Championships.

The 58-kilogram grappler can be excused for looking upon his silver medal with initial disappointment, however. After all, stating that he came close to gold would be a major understatement.

coin-toss advantage. From there he was eclipsed 1-0, surrendering the lone point with just 10 seconds remaining on a counter.

"Those type of losses don't get any easier to swallow. Yeah at first I was kind of bitter," recalled the local grappler, who's had a number of narrow championship defeats over the past couple of years — including at OFSAA. "He (Peruvian) was so strong on defence that anytime I made a move, he'd step back and I'd end-up burning energy. I just couldn't get in on him."

But an impressive all-around showing in his first appearance on the national team would soon overshadow that stinging conclúsion.

mark strong defence and a couple of well-executed firemans to turn back his first two opponents.


While coming out a bit tentative, he kicked off the day with a 2-1, 6-0 decision over a cadet from Hondouras scoring late in the first round before dominating the second.

He'd then advance to the final with

an opening-round pin-fall victory against Argentinian foe.

"My defence was pretty strong and I'd say it was one of my best performances ever," noted the silver medalist, who helped Canada's 17-member contingent to overall gold.

Added national cadet fellow and coach Miltonian Dave Mottram, "Duncan really wrestled well and held his own in the final. His technique's improving and if he keeps Moffat proudly displays his it up he's got more success ahead of him."



Making his latest title win all the more rewarding was the fact that he got payback on three adversaries who'd beaten him in high-stakes competition over the past year — including Newtonbrook's Cruiz Manning, who'd edged him out of OFSAA gold.

"That definitely gave me a lot of confidence for El Salvador," he said. "It got me past a hump and I went in (to Cadet Pan-Ams) on a high."

Moffat hopes to add another international medal in early October, when Commonwealth Games.
