Ready to get back behind the wheel

Fletcher makes return in Canadian Tire Series tomorrow in Montreal

John Fletcher knows there's far too much outside his control to leave anything within it to chance.

So when it his comes Dodge Avenger, the 41-year-old Miltonian takes

the term meticulous to a whole new level.

Some — like car owner Jim Bray — would probably throw out the phrase obsessive as well.

But that would hardly be used in any kind of derogatory manner.

"Like a lot of drivers, John can be moody. But there's no better fabricator (builder), set-up man or driver," said a rather blunt Bray, whom the local racing veteran has been driving for off and on since the late '90s. "He can do all three, and that's why I put up with his moods."

Never one to leave a single stone unturned when it comes to his car's performance, Fletcher initially questioned his readiness for tomorrow's (Saturday) NASCAR Canadian Tire Series event in Montreal.

That he'd consider pulling out of his only scheduled race this year speaks volumes about his commitment to both Bray and new sponsors London Mechanical and JBM Leasing.

"With John you'll never have a DNF (did not finish) because of workmanship or not being prepared," noted Bray.

Added Fletcher, "Most people would be shocked at how much work goes into getting a car ready, not just before the season starts but between races as well. You put a car through an awful lot and it's an amazing amount of work to keep it going — overwhelming, really.

"This can be a cruel sport, because nothing ever goes wrong in practices — it's always in the race. My philosophy is that there's a thousand different things that could mess me up out there and I have no idea what it could be until I check everything."

Of course the mechanic and car builder's own racing endeavours haven't kept him nearly as busy as in previous seasons — due to a harsh set of circumstances earlier this year.

After much discussion and debate, the Marauders will be on the road for tomorrow's (Saturday) first-round playoff game.


But the Marauders felt their neighbouring rivals should have got the victory by default over the Hawkeyes - who
