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underpass; and along Tremaine Road where some culverts were overwhelmed.

Fortunately, there wasn't much in the way of collisions.

"When we get this weather, there aren't a lot of accidents - everyone stays inside," Williams said.

Paul Cripps, director of the Town's Engineering Services, said operations staff were out in full force, first putting up signs alerting motorists to flooded roads and then working to unclog drains.

But he said he's certainly seen worse - like this past spring - and didn't think Milton fared too badly.

He said construction sites are particularly prone to flooding because the debris lying around can block catch basins.

the department's dispatcher was kept busy with calls from people reporting their smoke alarms were going off something that often happens with even very brief power outages.

. He reported one car accident that was storm-related on the westbound Hwy. 401, between Hwy. 6 and Guelph Line, but said it wasn't serious.

Of course, this most recent storm is just part of what's shaped up to be an exceptionally wet summer.

For the month of July, Basit said there was an average of 156 millimetres of precipitation recorded across the watershed — that's 205 per cent more than what's considered normal, he said, and more than three times what was received last year.

"If you want to chalk it up to global warming or seasonal trends, I don't know," he said.
