
Missed opportunities come back to haunt Magic

Chris Christoforou makes his much-anticipated return to the race bike this weekend, after a summer spent recovering from injury.

The three-time O'Brien Award winner (Canada's Driver of the Year) last drove nearly four months ago - during a qualifying session at Mohawk and has been off since due to a non-racing related accident.

"I fell off a ladder doing some work

outside my house," the Milton racer told Trot Insider last week, referring to his back injury.

The seasoned reinsman attempted a return in August — doing some work with local trainer Blair Burgess — but it wasn't long before he aggravated his back and was once again sidelined.

"It was frustrating. I tried to come back as early as I could, but I just needed to give it time. The last thing that I

wanted to do was come back, have the injury flare up again and then have to take more time off."

"I didn't want to come back, race two days out of the week and then have to book off the rest. It wouldn't be fair to the owners, trainers or anybody."

A winner of more than 5,200 career victories and \$82 million in purses, Christoforou is scheduled to make his return this Sunday at Mohawk.
