

As the league's most penalized team so far this season, the IceHawks haven't had too many nights in which they've been more disciplined than the opposition.

Friday marked one of those rare occasions — and the payoff was unmistakable.

Showing far more restraint than the Mississauga Chargers over the final two periods, Milton scored four powerplay goals in just over seven minutes — three of them on two-man advantages — on the way to an 8-2 rout.
