St. Marys files rezoning application for quarry

St. Marys CBM has filed an application with the City of Hamilton for rezoning and an Official Plan Amendment (OPA) for a 10.6-acre parcel of land on Milburough Line.

The application, filed early in December, is part of overall plan to establish a northeast quarry in Flamborough near Campbellville.

A separate, but similar application was filed for adjacent lands in September 2004 to permit a large limestone quarry near the corner of 11th Concession Road East and Milburough Line.

The recent application, calling for rezoning of the land from agricultural/conservation management to extractive industrial, is needed to provide an entrance and exit driveway for quarry trucks.

While separate from the application filed with Hamilton in 2004, it will be reviewed by City staff in concert with the overall quarry development propos-

"It will be wrapped up into one application," said Hamilton senior planner Chris Bell, noting that the land is adjacent to the property for the proposed quarry.

St. Marys spokesperson Jennifer Tuck said the Milburough Line property wasn't included in the company's original application. Rezoning is being sought now, "just to provide access to the quarry," she said, adding that the Milburough Line property has always been featured on maps whenever the quarry foot-


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
