### School board calendar not yet official

While both the Halton Catholic and public school boards approved a school schedule that will start before the Labour Day weekend, it's not official just yet.

There's one step left before the schedule is implemented. The Ministry of Education needs to approve the schedule.

Burlington MPP and Conservative Education Critic Joyce Savoline has heard a number of complaints and stands with the parents who are outraged about the schedule that could interfere with families who have already booked their summer vacation plans.

"This is a little late to be changing plans," Savoline said. "Being on summer holiday until Labour Day is something we've counted on for years."

Every year, after a school board approves a schedule, it goes to the Ministry of Education for confirmation. The deadline for ministry approval is May 31.

If a calendar isn't approved, it's returned to the school board, which must approve a revised schedule.


