But although they have a great time together, there are certainly challenges, namely finding venues in which to play. Matt explained with Milton's population explosion, there are many new, young bands forming and vying for limited spaces in which to pertorm.

"You make friends with the bands, but there's always some competition," he said.

Without the Internet, Matt said he doesn't know where the band would be - most likely nowhere. -Putting their songs up on MySpace is an easy, cheap way for the group to get exposure and gives their fans instant access, he said.

Just as the guys have the same favourite memory, performing with the Flatliners, they also have the same goal.

"We just kind of want to expose our music to the world — that's every band's dream," Matt said.
