It took three decades for the I Milton Springers to produce their first all-around provincial champion.

Sydney Townsend made sure the wait for a second wasn't anywhere near as long.

Putting a golden exclamation mark on a muchimproved season, the nineyear-old gymnast upstaged four competitors to reign supreme in her Level 7 age class late last month in Windsor.

This gave the local club its second Ontario title in just three years,

following Celena Morgan's 2007 triumph in the Level 6, 10-year-old ranks.

"It felt really good to win," said the newly-crowned provincial champ, who'd delivered a modest ninth-place overall finish at her first qualifier but quickly put herself in contention with bronze and gold-medal showings at the next two events.

When it was all said and done, she beat out an Ottawa girl for all-around bronze by a mere tenth of a point in a Springers', field of 24.


