

Man arrested after vehicles stolen, broken into

A Milton man is facing a slew of charges in connection with a series of vehicle thefts and break-ins.

Overnight March 27, a vehicle was stolen from a Hepburn Road address and located, stripped of parts, in the garage of a Scott Boulevard house under construction.

Overnight May 6, four tires were stolen off a vehicle on Howden Crescent.

May 13, two vehicles were broken into and one was stolen. From a vehicle on Hood Terrace, a satellite radio and sunglasses were stolen, while a laptop computer was stolen from a vehicle on Slessor Trail.

Also on Hood Terrace, a 2003, two-door Acura was swiped but recovered in the neighbourhood.

A 26-year-old Woodward Avenue man has been charged with theft over \$5,000, break and enter, possession of stolen property, trespass

by night and three counts each of theft under \$5,000 and breach of an undertaking.

Tow truck stolen

Police are investigating the theft of a tow truck worth \$100,000.

Sometime overnight May 20, an unknown suspect entered the property of CA Towing on Campbellville

Road and stole the white, 2005 GMC Sierra.

The vehicle has 'CA Towing' printed on the doors and the licence plate is CATOWING.

Pick-up truck swiped

A pick-up truck was stolen from the driveway of a Maple Avenue condominium.

Police said the theft occurred sometime between noon May 20 and 8 a.m. May 21.

It's described as a blue 2004 GMC pick-up in mint condition with extended cab, 20-inch chrome rims and a blue tarp covering the bed.

Its licence plate is 1057NM and it's worth \$17,000.

Building equipment stolen

Expensive construction equipment was stolen from a building site on Pettit Trail sometime last week-

An undisclosed amount of cash was taken.

Rings missing

Police are investigating after a resident at Martindale Gardens seniors' home alleged she had five rings stolen between May 14 and 18.

The rings, worth a total of more than \$5,000, include a gold wedding ring and various gold rings with diamonds.

The woman also reported a Royal Doulton figurine missing, police said.

Storage facility entered

A Steeles Avenue storage site was broken into last week.

Sometime between 2 p.m. May 17 and 10 a.m. May 19, unknown suspects entered the U-Need Storage facility and removed a lock to break into a bin, police said.

A table saw worth about \$800

was stolen.

Bike stolen

A bicycle was stolen from a Martin Street garage overnight Sunday.

Police said the garage was closed but not locked at the time.

The white KHS bike is worth \$475.

Thieves target liquor store

Halton Regional Police are investigating a theft at a local retail store.

Shortly after 2 p.m. April 16, a man and a woman entered the LCBO located at 830 Main St.

While the woman diverted the clerk's attention, the man removed numerous bottles of liquor — Courvoisier and Hennessy — from the shelf and put them into a backpack.

He was last seen on foot heading toward Thompson Road.

The woman also left the store on foot and headed west from Main Street.

The male suspect is described as black, in his late twenties, six feet tall and 165 pounds with short black hair either in dreadlocks or tight curls. He wore a black jacket with a hood and a green design on the back of the jacket. He also wore a distinctive pair of black track pants with a white stripe running



vertically down each side of the pant legs, and black shoes. He was carrying a black backpack.

The female suspect is described as black, in her late twenties, five-foot-two, 110 pounds, with black, straight, shoulder-length hair. She wore a dark blue jean jacket, a green shirt, black jeans and white running shoes.

LARVAL MOSQUITO MONITORING AND PESTICIDE USE

407 ETR Concession Company Limited will conduct larval mosquito monitoring from June 8 to September 25, 2009 and, as may be required, a larviciding program from June 15 to September 30, 2009. 407 ETR is undertaking these measures to meet any requirements of local Medical Officers of Health to control larval mosquitoes to prevent their development into potential carriers of the West Nile Virus. Applicators, licensed by the Ministry of Environment, or trained technicians will apply the larvicide in Storm-water detention ponds and Catch basins on Highway 407 ETR throughout the municipalities of Halton, Peel, York and Durham only where it is determined prudent to do so.

The pellet formulation of the larvicide Vectobac 200G (Bti), Pest Control Products Act No.18158, will be placed into Storm-water detention ponds and the briquette formulation of the larvicide Altosid (Methoprene) Pest Control Products Act No. 27694, will be placed into Catch basins on Highway 407 ETR throughout the municipalities of Halton, Peel, York and Durham, only where it is determined prudent to do so.
