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Unusual path to nationals for Anderson

Perennial 4s contender qualifies for pairs championship in T.O.

That pretty much encapsulates the latest lawn bowler chapter for David Anderson, who later this month will find himself on the national stage for the ninth time in 10 years.

But recent qualifying efforts came with a twist.



Plagued by inconsistency, McKerihan and company suffered a decisive first-round loss at last month's provincials in Sarnia, with the 14-9 defeat a major letdown for a team that had claimed Ontario supremacy six times in the previous eight years.

"It was a reminder that in lawn bowling, anybody can beat anybody on any given day," said 47-year-old Anderson. "Certainly we've got a bullseye on our backs, and we just weren't consistent. But losing sometimes isn't such a bad thing. It keeps you on the right side of level-headedness."

Be that as it may, the notion of missing out on this year's national championships wasn't sitting well with Part of Steve McKerihan's reigning Canadian 4s Anderson, who moments after the early exit from
