NICHE program promotes elder-friendly environment

HHS partners with international program

How a hospital cares for its elderly population is telling about its culture of care.

With that in mind, Halton Healthcare Services (HHS) has enhanced its Safer Elder Care program by partnering with Nurses Improving Care for Healthsystem Elders (NICHE), an international program renowned for helping hospitals improve the care of older adult patients.

Recently, HHS's three commu- practice clinician. nity hospitals, including Milton District Hospital, became the first non-teaching hospitals in Ontario to be awarded the NICHE designation for providing geriatric-sensitive care.

"More than 58 per cent of Healthcare Services' Halton patients are over the age of 65, and

as such face a variety of health risks specific to elders," said Delayne Haasz, a member of the Safe Elder Care Task Force.

"We wanted to focus on the unique and complex needs of our elderly population and how we could enhance their care in the safest possible way."

NICHE provides nurses with the tools they need to quickly detect and treat common geriatric problems such as delirium, dementia or depression, said Colleen Silver, HHS professional

"It allows us to create a more elder-friendly environment," she

To achieve the NICHE designation, HHS had to develop and submit a comprehensive Elder Care Action Plan and demonstrate continuous quality improvements to geriatric-sensitive care.
