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pipes drilled down into the ground at each bungalow. Each home would also have a 4,500-watt rooftop solar power array, de Sylva said.

He said he also intends to preserve a historic home on the property that was once owned by former Miltonian Johnson Harrison, who died in 1907.

Harrison, son of early settler and Milton's first school-teacher Elizabeth Harrison, built the Georgian brick house in 1860, according to the Milton Historical Society.

De Sylva said he plans to submit the development applications to the Town soon, and will hold a publicity launch in late October.

De Sylva said his environmental developments today are different than the subdivisions in Meadowvale he worked on 30 years ago — a type of residential building he now predicts will be gone in 30 years as Canada's communities become more like Europe's.

"How'd the epiphany happen? One word — thinking," he said of his enthusias-

tic embrace of condominiums and pollution-free building techniques.

"Any fool can repeat what the last guy did — that's easy."

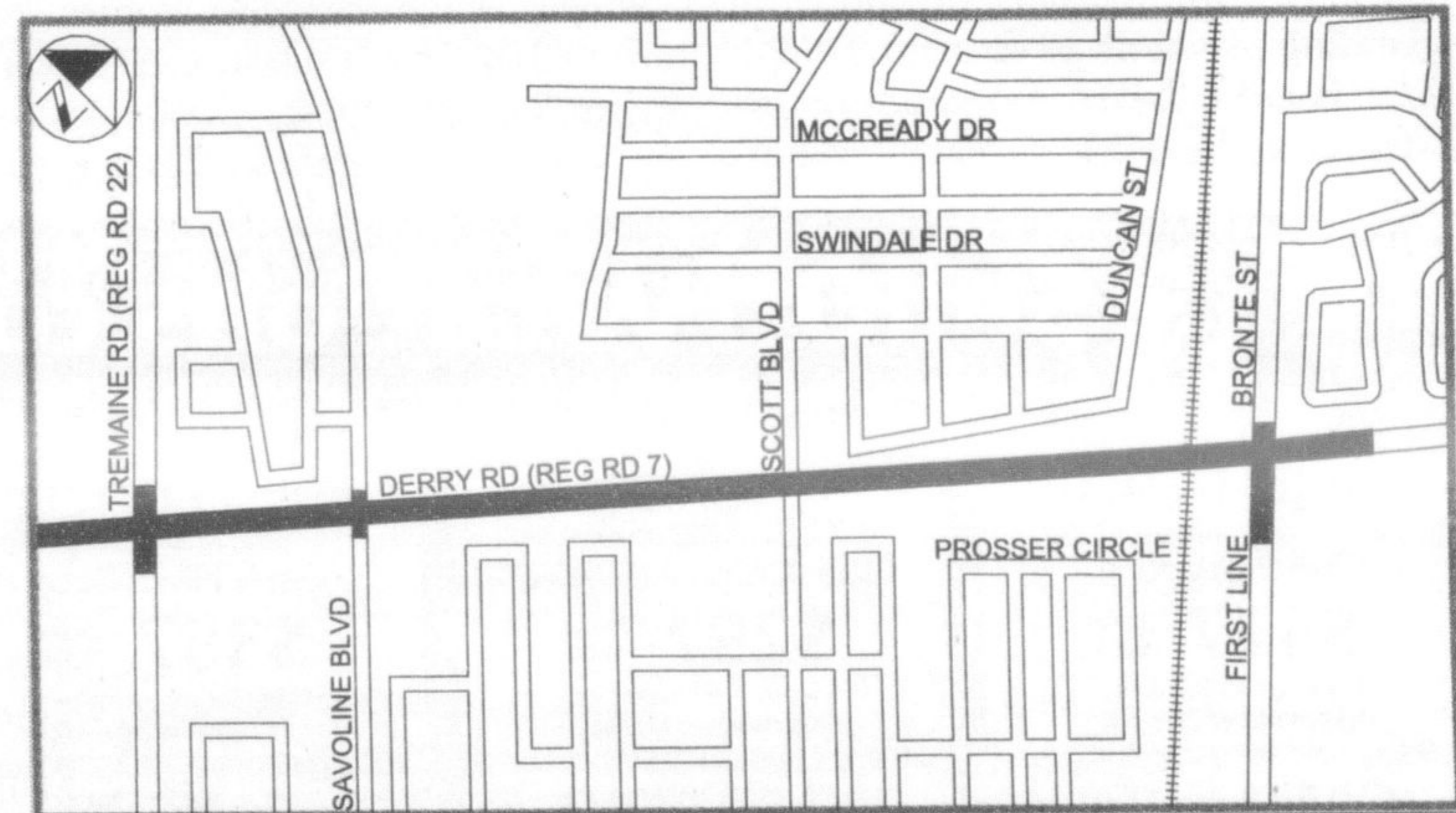

Volunteers needed for provincial drinking water lead testing program



Halton Region is committed to providing residents and businesses with safe, clean drinking water. Halton has routinely tested for the presence of lead and historically there have been no issues with lead in our municipal drinking water. However, as legislated by the Ministry of Environment, Halton Region must test for the presence of lead in drinking water at consumers' taps. Halton Region is looking for residents and businesses to volunteer for this community-wide drinking water sampling program.

- We are looking for people who live in an older home who suspect they have a lead service connection or lead in their home's plumbing. (Homes built before 1952 may have lead service connections or internal lead plumbing, and homes built before 1990 may have lead solder connecting copper pipes.)
- Halton staff will require access to your property to collect a sample. Testing is free and the results will be shared with you.
